

CHARACTER BUILDING

This means being responsible, trustworthy and respectful! Your fellow Key Clubbers rely on you to do everything that you say you will do, so do it, especially if you're an officer. Do not take on too many responsibilities and if your workload gets too much, ask for help! Also, make sure that you're respectful of others opinions. You are not going to agree with everything another person says, and that is just human nature, just make sure you respect it.

LEADERSHIP

Key Club leaders help their fellow club members stay organized, motivated and engaged. You're already compassionate and contribute to your school. That's why you joined Key Club! Start small to make your world better. Pick up litter, hold doors for people, push in chairs when you leave a table and thank everyone who helps you. Work with younger kids at your school, religious organization or in a K-Kids or Builders Club. To younger kids, you're already cool—a leader—and they might be a less threatening audience to start with than your peers. Volunteer to solve a problem. That's the first step to preparing for a local, district or international office.

INCLUSIVENESS

You know how awful it feels to be left out. You can stop the hurt by being inclusive, starting with an open mind and a welcoming attitude. At school or at a Key Club event, talk to that person that's standing by themselves. Initiate conversations with people you don't usually talk to. Avoid basing people off of stereotypes and truly take time to get to know a person. Key Club is so diverse, so take some time to learn about the different cultures that are represented in our club. Trust me, it's worth it.

CARING

A smile is the universal key for entry into any situation because people are hardwired to respond. Those are your mirror neurons at work, says Marco Iacoboni, a neuroscientist at the University of California at Los Angeles. When people see you smiling, their brains automatically imitate the smile and the caring feelings that come with it. Incorporate caring when you: Build smiles into club culture. Each time you see a fellow or potential member at school, ash your pearly whites.

MARCH OF DIMES



Since the 1940s, Key Clubs have worked with March of Dimes to make a positive impact in the lives of babies everywhere. Today, Kiwanis members continue that culture of service by supporting the March of Dimes all year long by hosting service projects, raising funds and educating communities about the crisis of preterm birth.

UNICEE



UNICEF is the only organization of the United Nations dedicated exclusively to children. Working with other United Nations bodies, governments and non-governmental organizations, UNICEF helps to provide for children's needs in more than 150 developing countries through community-based services in primary health care, basic education and safe water and sanitation.

PEDIATRIC TRAUMA PROGRAM



Did you know that unintentional injury is the #1 killer of children under 14 in the United States and that 90% of these injuries can be prevented. The Kiwanis CNH foundation recognized a serious need for education and training in the pediatric trauma and injury prevention. From there, the foundation established the Pediatric Trauma Program in 1994.

TEACHER APPRECIATION WEEK


DIVISION 28 NORTH | JERYLE SARTE


