

\$200 Adult Chaperone

Adults age 21 and older may apply to be an Adult Chaperone at a Key Leader Camp. This requires the adult to be an active adult participant throughout the weekend. Adults must adhere to the same code of conduct and requirements as the students and are asked to not leave the camp site during the weekend. A Kiwanis Background Check must be completed 4 weeks prior to camp and be returned cleared to participate.

1. How will the Club receive the funds?

There is not a starting cost for the fundraiser to happen!

3. Is there a limit on the number of fundraisers a club can run?

No, but it is recommended that you only run one fundraiser at a time.

DUEPROCESS

Removal of an officer should be the last resort. The Board of Directors should help the officer in question grow and learn.

- STEP
- Any member may recommend the removal of a club officer to the Board of Director.
- STEP 2
- The President & Advisor should meet with the officer in question to privately discuss how the officer can improve their performance.
- STEP 3
- If the officer continues to fail to fulfill their responsibilities, the Board of Directors will need to hold a meeting to either approve or reject the recommendation.
- STEP 4 If approved, a meeting should be held with the entire club to vote on the removal of an officer.
- STEP 5 2/3 quorum of dues paid members is required in order for the removal to be approved.
- In the event any officers should be removed from office, the officer should be notified by the secretary in writing.
- The school, advisors, and Lt. Governor should be notified of the removal.

Pediatric Trauma Program

No-Slip Sock-Making Mills | D34N | R17

"Our club was looking for ideas for the September SOSP, and we decided upon making no slip socks for children to donate to a local children's ward. I talked with the president of South San Francisco, and we coordinated a location, date, time, and supplies. They booked a meeting room at the South San Francisco Library on Grand Avenue from 1:30pm - 5pm. Our Key Club hosted a sock drive where donors were put into a raffle for free spirit gear. We also bought socks and squeeze bottle fabric paint from Amazon. We brought the supplies to the library, and together with South City, we made no-slip socks with fabric paint and socks. We ended up leaving the socks in the library for the weekend to dry before picking them up later next week.

Before, most of our service projects usually consisted of volunteering at an organized event, like a festival. While these are fun and entertaining, making no-slip socks gave us the chance to have a direct, charitable impact on someone else. We know that someone will end up enjoying and wearing what we made. I believe that the

project was successful -- we ended up making over a hundred pairs of no-slip socks, and everyone had fun at the same time."

"We planned a non-slip sock service event at a local park near our school. Because of the expected heat in our area, we tried to find an event that would not be labor-intensive; however, the most important aspect of the service project was that it had to be fun. Getting the required materials was the most difficult part. Our school has regulations that prevented us from shipping items directly to our homes from Amazon, so we had to wait until the package were shipped to our school. After that, all we had to do was create a spreadsheet asking for sock donations. Initially, very few people signed up for this event. If this service project was incorporated into a larger event, such as a social, I think that many more people would have showed up. Thankfully, a lot of people signed up last minute. Although the project was not as grand as others, it was a very fun event. Since we planned for this event to run for three hours, and we were all close in proximity, people who had never talked to each other before were able to interact and bond. But, most importantly we made a large box worth of socks that the kids at a local hospital will definitely like."

"With the help of Interact, we planned to have small boxes that volunteers can paint and fill with various bandaids, ointment, and alcohol wipes that were all ordered from Amazon. The day of, we set up our local library community room so that putting together the first aid kits would be "buffet style," starting. off with grabbing a box and going down the line with all the other items used to fill the kits.

After all the kits were painted, a local family shelter was contacted and will soon be receiving the kits.

The event was a fun way to get our volunteers together to show everyone's creativity. The event was very successful with 30 volunteers. A problem that we did run into was limited supply since it was a little pricey, so for the future we would definitely try to find a more budget friendly way to hold this event so we can have an even greater volunteer turn-out"


