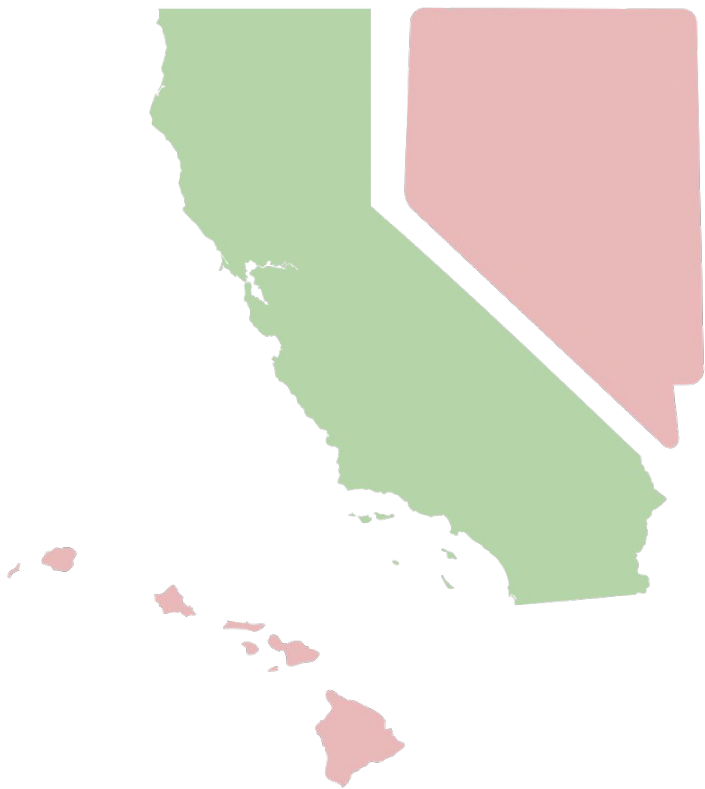

Student Loans

- **Types of Loans:**

- Need-Based Loans:

- Federal Perkins Loans:

- Awarded to students with the highest need

- Federal Direct Subsidized Loans:

- Interest-free in college & borrow a limit that increases per year

- Non-Need-Based Loans:

- Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loans:

- Charge interest, but can add interest fees borrowed amount until after graduation

- Federal Direct PLUS Loans:

- Allow parents (or graduate students) borrow total cost of college, minus any financial aid received

- State Loans

- Individualized per state.

- Private Loans:

- Are not subsidized or need-based, often require a co-signer

Tips & Tricks:

- Compare financial aid offers
- Ask questions and follow instructions
- Note private-loan credit requirements
- Consider making interest payments while in college

● **Repayment:**

- Standard repayment:
 - Monthly payments over a 10-year period
- Extended repayment:
 - If you qualify for this payment plan, you can extend your repayment period for up to 25 years
- Graduated repayment:
 - Under this plan, your payments gradually increase, usually every two years
- Income-based repayment:
 - This option ties your repayment amount to your income. It often allows for a longer repayment period

ELIMINATING MNT

International Kiwanis supports the Eliminate Project. The Eliminate Project supports elimination of Maternal and Neonatal Tetanus. This is a terrible tragedy for mothers and their unborn children.



In countries where people lack health care, education, and services, a baby can be infected with Tetanus during birth and can die within days. That short lifetime is agonizing—a heartbreaking struggle to breathe and to cope and marked by convulsions triggered by the slightest sound or contact. This disease is easily preventable.



Women of childbearing age need to be vaccinated to protect them and their future newborns. The Eliminate Project protects and provides women with 3 doses of vaccine, syringes, safe transport and storage, education of communities, training of health workers and more.

Getting involved with the KFam

THE SIX BRANCHES OF KIWANIS

K-Kids is the branch of the Kiwanis Family that is associated with **elementary school kids**.

Builder's Club is the branch of the Kiwanis Family that is tailored to **middle school (junior high school) students**.

Key Club is the branch of the Kiwanis Family that focuses on **high school students**. They are the largest branch of the Kiwanis Family (with over 250,000 members). Structurally, this is the youngest branch to have a student-led leadership similar to that of Kiwanis International.

KIWINS is the **32nd District of Key Club International**. They were created to provide women the opportunity to serve their community. Most KIWINS merged with Key Clubs, but CNH KIWINS still remains.

Circle K International (CKI) is the branch of the Kiwanis Family for **college students**. They perform more service hours per member than any other branch in the Kiwanis Family. CKI was also the first branch to allow women into their organization. Kiwanis International followed suit several years later.

Kiwanis International is the parent organization of all the branches in the Kiwanis Family. **Anyone that is over 18** can join Kiwanis.

Aktion Club is the branch of the Kiwanis Family for **adults with disabilities**. They are the fastest growing branch within the Kiwanis Family.

POSSIBLE SERVICE PROJECTS

- Host a Serve-a-thon, where everyone comes together to perform various kinds of service projects
- Make kits to donate for the less fortunate
- Host a donation drive across all the different schools
- Write letters to children in hospitals

COMMUNICATING WITH OTHERS

It is important to reach out and communicate with other branches of Kiwanis!! By branching out and creating new bonds, it is a great way to **learn new perspectives** as well as **gaining advice** from those different than us. Make sure to **reach out** to them by **emailing** them or contacting them through **social media**!! Do not be afraid to reach out as they are always ready to help.

Most clubs have a sponsoring Kiwanis or local Kiwanis club that they can **partner up for events**!! Start there and make your way around the different branches. Kiwanians are the foundation of this organization. They have the most knowledge and resources to help us connect to others.

In the CNH District, there are 73 colleges that have a Circle K. **If you check on the CNH Circle K website, they have a list of college campuses that have a Circle K** (<https://www.cnhcirclek.org/our-clubs/>). **Do not be afraid to ask them if they want to work on a service project together.** Circle K's also hosts Key To College every year to inform Key Clubbers about college and applications, so see if your local Circle K is hosting one!!

If you have a K-Kids or Builder's Club, **try to visit them** and offer them advice. If you want to start one, contact your Kiwanis to help make that happen.

If you are unsure of the local branches in your community, do not be afraid to ask your lieutenant governor!! They can help exchange contact information and set up possible events.

TIPS AND TRICKS

- **Start early**!! Planning events take time and you may need to fill out paperwork for larger events.
- **Promote, promote, promote**!! You want as many people to attend as possible.
- Make sure there is **time for socializing** because you want to get to know other branches more!!
- **Consider activities that works for you and the branch/branches you are collaborating with!!**

frequently asked questions

Q1: How Do I Apply?

You do NOT need to! As long as you are dues paid and have completed the hours requirement, your club Secretary and President will keep track of the additional requirements and your LTG will report it to the District for Recognition.

Q2: How can I ensure that I meet one of the levels of Recognition?

You can simply ask your club Secretary to let you know where you are at and what specific requirements you need to work on. You have until the end of January to fulfill as many requirements as you can!

Q3: Why should I aim to fulfill the requirements?

Your name will be on display at DCON on the screen & on a banner and you will also receive a certificate. If you achieve PLATINUM Recognition, you will have the privilege of walking on stage to receive your award!

Q4: How can I find out more information regarding every requirement? What If I have more specific questions?

Feel free to contact your LTG if you have any specific questions regarding the MRP or recognition in general. In addition, feel free to visit bit.ly/mrprubric1920 as many questions about other items needed to be done are explained on the second page of the form on the Cyberkey.!

CLUB ELECTIONS

What does it mean to be **elected**?

Elections (uh·lek·shns) are group-based decisions, in which a club votes based on who members believe represent their goals and should serve on the board.

Often times, this is conducted through a majority vote. Candidates are not revealed to the public and should be kept a secret until the day of. Audience members also gain the ability for caucus, in which candidates have a certain amount of time to answer any questions the club may have for them.

Election processes may differ from club to club. Talk to your current president for more information.

Key Club International holds a very-strict **no-campaigning** policy. Any one found guilty of this offense may be prevented from running for office.

- Maintain an organized record of expenses

Secretary

- Record meeting minutes
- Record service hours
- Update the MRF monthly
- Keep an organized recognition tab
- Create a roster

Historian/Editor

- Submit articles and visuals
- Update the club website
- Take photos at services and events
- Produce newsletters & graphics

Additional positions may be offered by your club. Please talk to your club president for more information

ELECTION TIPS

- Memorize your speech
- Speak confidently!
- Walk around, use body movements. Don't glue your elbows to the side of your body!
- Project your voice
- Know your audience and the environment
- Plan ahead and identify what the club needs and what/how you can assist the club in overcoming their issues
- Make eye contact
- Breathe. Don't rush your presentation due to nervousness.
- Utilize ethos, pathos, and logos, in order to make your speech the most effective and appeal to your audience
- Practice to ensure your speech doesn't go over the allotted time
- Memorize the points in your speech, not word-for word
- Be flexible! Gauge the audiences reactions and use that information to base how you continue your speech
- Let your personality shine. Being professional is always good, but often times than not, the audience will know who you are as a person. Overdoing it and erasing all personality prevents you from establishing trust

FALL RALLY SOUTH, DIVISION 42 EAST, MINDY NGUYEN

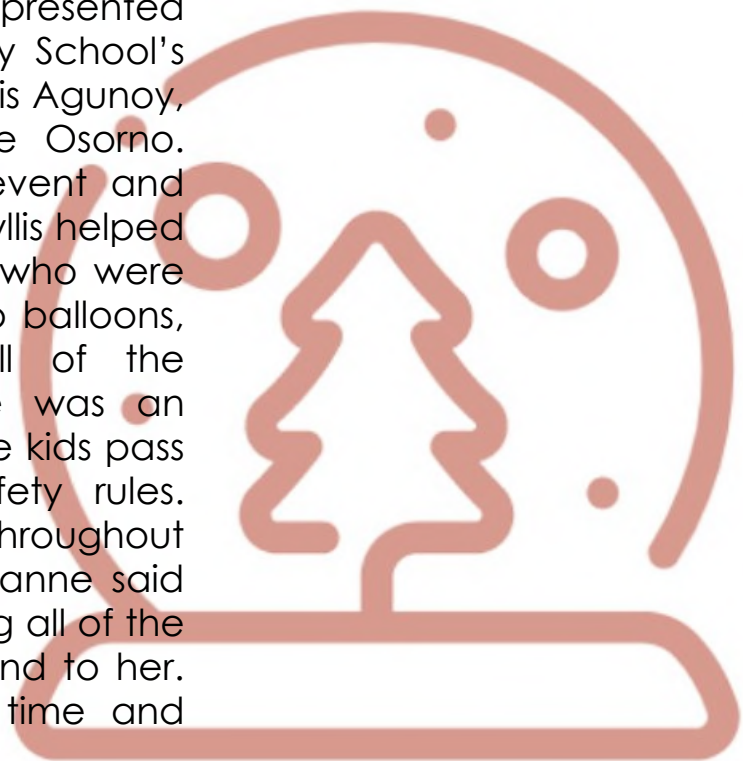
