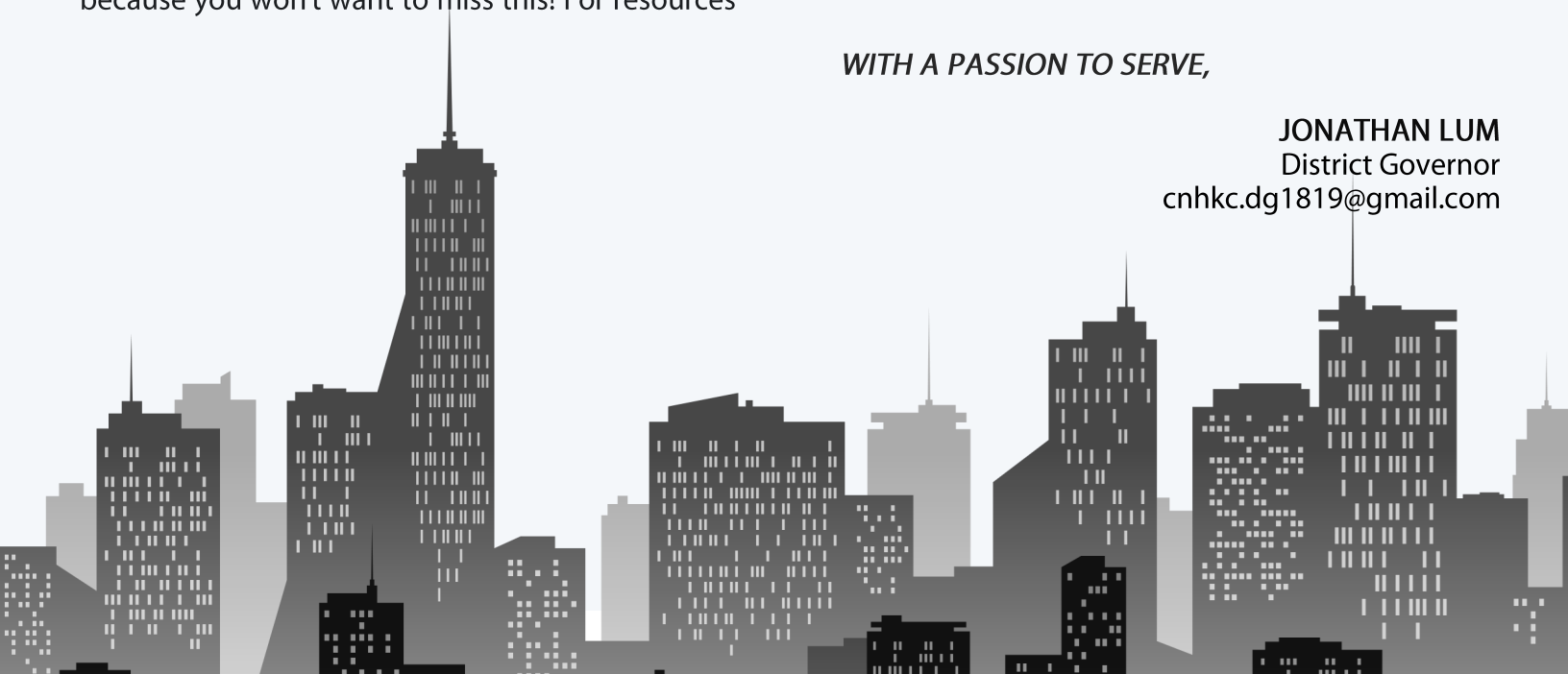
design, contests are a great way to showcase your journey as a Key Club servant leader during the 2018-2019 term!

promoting club elections

getting members to vote

A minimum of 50% of the club's dues-paid members must be present for club elections and 50% of clubs should be present for Division elections. BEE sure to promote elections to all members!

Here are ways to promote elections:

- Have incentives for election days! Have special merchandise or food available at elections.
- Remind members that it is their responsibility to elect new officers, deciding the future of the club!
- Utilize Social Media to promote elections!

Make sure you check out the Policy Manual on the CyberKey to ensure you're abiding by the rules!

encouraging members to run

Anyone can BEE a leader, and pursuing a Key Club officer position is a perfect opportunity to build leadership. Any member in good standing that has a passion for serving their home, school, and community is encouraged to run.

Here are some benefits of running for office:

- Build skills in public speaking, teamwork, and communication
- Strengthen your time management and organization
- Apply your talents to benefit the club you serve
- Have a bigger hand in impacting your club

vote in elections!

impact the future of key club

Your voice is your vote! You don't have to be running for a position to make an impact on your home club. Be sure to take your vote seriously, because the decisions you make while electing your officers will determine the future of Key Club!

Keep in mind for elections:

- Make sure you're dues paid! If you aren't you won't be able to vote.
- Show up regularly to Key Club meetings! Think about what changes you want to see.
- Listen to candidates' speeches! Make sure you understand their platforms and goals before you cast your vote.
- Ask questions during caucus! This is your chance to address any issues you have or get your questions cleared up.
- Vote fairly! Approach each candidate with an open mind, and vote based on who you think will serve your club the best.



Get Letter of Recommendations/E-Signature Approvals Early!

Chances are, whoever you're asking is probably busy with their personal life too. They may even be writing a lot of people's letters, so make sure you give them adequate time to write yours.

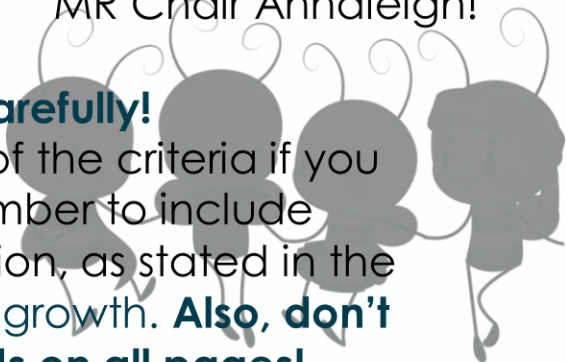
Give Yourself Enough Time in Advance!

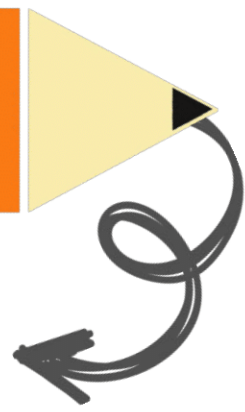
Ask for Help!

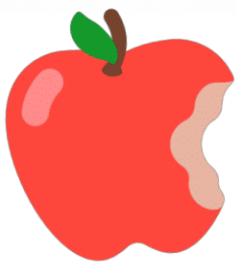


BACK TO SCHOOL SHOPPING

What made you want to stay in Key Club?

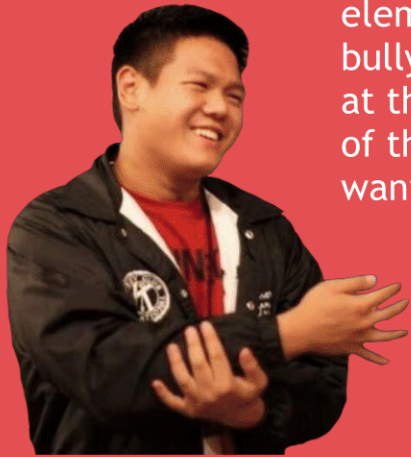

Conclave Procedures & Details

What is Conclave?

A division meeting in which a Lieutenant Governor is elected to serve the division as a district and international liaison for one term.



Who can Attend?

Typically, all Key Clubber may attend conclave. Each Dues Paid club may have up to 2 delegates to vote for the best candidate to be the next Lieutenant Governor.

Process and Rules of Conclaves:

- **Speech:** Candidates allowed a 3-5 minute speech
- **Literature:** The only campaign material permissible is a 1, 2-sided page Literature printed and distributed in the official Candidate Booklet published by the Lt. Governor. Absolutely NO early distribution or promotion via social media.
- **Caucus:** The audience is allowed 4 minutes for caucusing. It is an opportunity for audience to ask questions to each candidate.

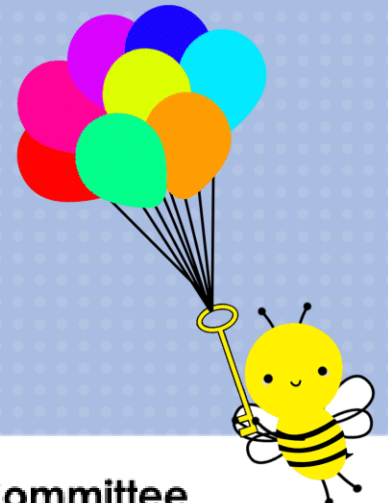

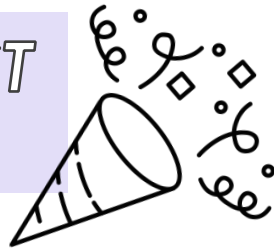
