GET A HEAD **START**

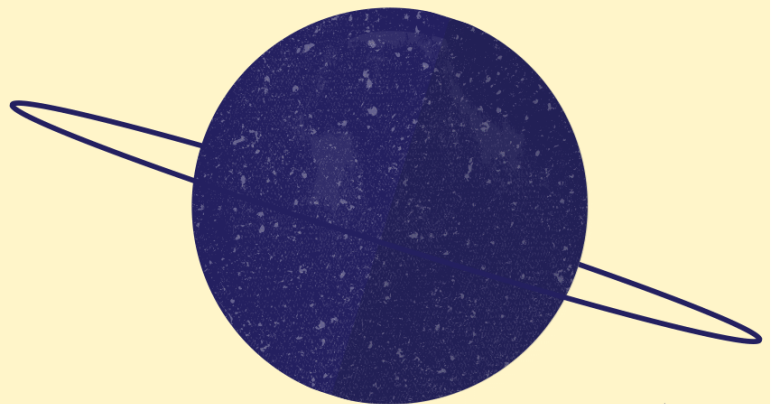

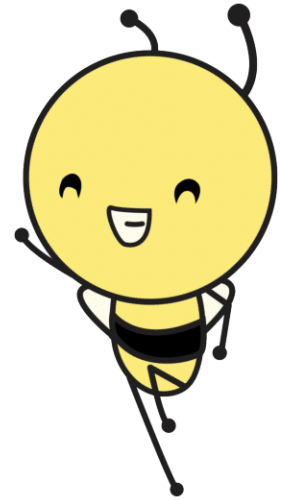

Club Elections

As the term comes to a close, the time to elect club officers for the 2019-2020 term is now! BEE sure to follow all the rules to ensure a valid election.



Club Positions

President

The president presides over the Club board. They are responsible for hosting club/board meetings, delegating tasks, holding officer elections, and more!

Vice President

There may be multiple Vice Presidents assigned to different roles and responsibilities. There is no limit on how many Club Vice Presidents there may be, but it is preferred to have no more than seven.

Secretary

Club secretaries are responsible for handling club records, submitting the Club Monthly Report Form to their respective lieutenant governor, updating club bylaws and much more!

Treasurer

Treasurers are responsible for ensuring that the Club's finances are all in check. Whether it be collecting and sending dues to International or keeping track of the annual budget, there are many things a treasurer is responsible for.

Editor & Historian

Editors and historians document everything the Club does. Through videos, pictures, social media, and even submissions to the Division Newsletter Editor help showcase what each club has been up to!



Election Procedures

To ensure that your Club is hosting a valid election, BEE sure to follow the proper procedures listed down below!

Only dues-paid members are able to vote! Anyone that is NOT a dues-paid member can sit and watch.

If there are more than two candidates running for a position, a nomination conference should be held beforehand to reduce the number of candidates to two.

Don't forget to check out the club elections guide on the Cyberkey for more information!

Candidates may create a literature to distribute at the Club elections, but they may not advertise nor promote themselves or else they will be immediately disqualified.

After hosting a valid election, ensure that the Club Secretary updates the "Club Elections" tab on the MRF.

Train your officer elects and leave a legacy you're proud of!

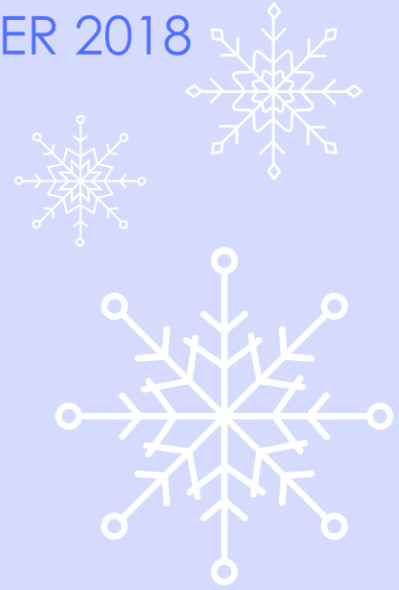

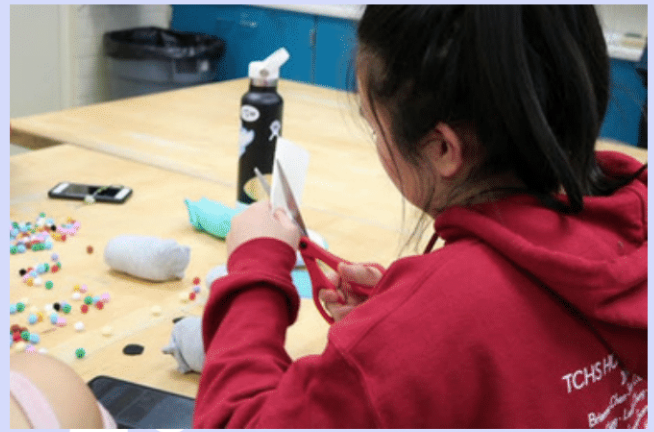
Sock Animals for Homeless Children

Operation Christmas 2018 lasted two weeks, from December 4th to December 18th, in which our club adopted 7 families from the Salvation Army's Adopt-a-Family program, promising to provide food, clothes, and gifts to last the holiday season. It is a school-wide event primarily coordinated by our Vice President, Meghan Lee. First, classrooms had to be divided among the 7 families, with combinations of teachers and grade levels that would best fit each family's needs. Then, each club officer's responsibilities had to be delegated, from the Historians' publicity tasks to the Fundraising Heads' outside fundraising responsibilities. Meghan created a shared folder for the club officers and faculty/Kiwanis advisors to access, which contained these divided responsibilities and additional forms, including the list of food items that were needed and the descriptions of each of the seven families. Groups of club officers were assigned to each family/classroom grouping, and for two weeks, they went to the homeroom classes to explain what the drive was and to ask for donations. They used the money that was donated in the homerooms, and the weekend before the drive ended, each family group went to Walmart to purchase the gifts, clothing, and gift cards for their respective families. The day the drive ended, December 18th, was Packaging Day, during which everyone involved (both club officers and homeroom representatives) went to our school's gym and packaged all the food, gifts, and clothing that was donated for the drive. It took about one class period, and soon a truck from the Salvation Army arrived and everyone helped load the boxes and gift bags onto the truck.

DISASTER RELIEF

What is Disaster Relief?

Disaster relief plays a vital role in large-scale disasters and is an important part of disaster response and recovery. Disaster Relief is used to provide private and secure places for people to live who have left or lost their belongings as a result of some form of disaster.

RECENT disasters



WILDFIRES

The 2018 wildfire season was the deadliest and most destructive wildfire season on record in California, with a total of 8,527 fires burning an area of 1,893,913 acres, the largest amount of burned acreage recorded in a fire season, as of December 21.

MASS SHOOTINGS

The Las Vegas mass shooting has been the deadliest of its kind in modern US history. The massacre unfolded in a storm of chaos and confusion. 58 people were killed and more than 850 injured when a gunman opened fire at a country music festival on the Las Vegas Strip on October 1, 2017.

VOLCANOES

All other natural disasters contribute greatly to the eruption of active volcanoes.

EARTHQUAKES

On May 4, 2018, an earthquake with a 6.9 magnitude killed 2 people and injured 28.

HURRICANES

Hurricane Olivia cost \$25 million in damages and Hurricane Lane cost \$250 million in damages.

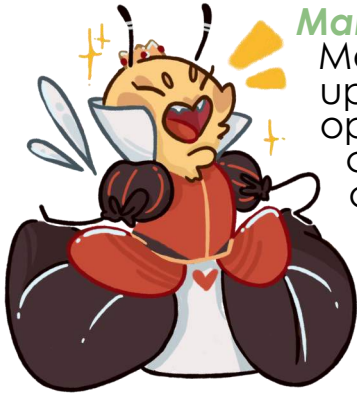
Disaster Relief Grant Program

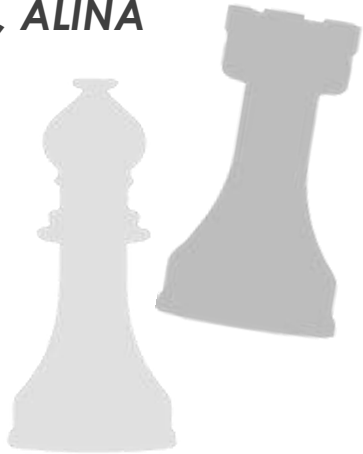
DIVISION 44 SOUTH | RIO AMERICANO

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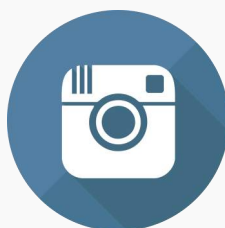

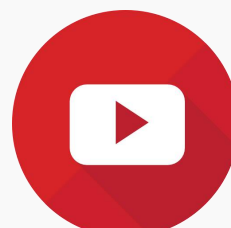
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
