

Want to make something yummy & easy while you have nothing to do in quarantine? Here's one of your District News Editor's favorite recipes to make!

BROWN BUTTER CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

INGREDIENTS makes about 10

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- -1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- pinch of salt
- 3/4 cup (packed) brown sugar
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large (room temperature) egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 8 oz of semisweet chocolate
- bars, chopped OR semisweet
- chocolate chips
- (optional) sea salt (for
- garnishing on top)

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Cook butter over medium heat stirring frequently until toasted (~5-7min). Let cool. 2. Combine brown butter with the sugars. 3. Beat in the egg and vanilla. 4. In a separate bowl, combine the dry ingredients (flour, baking soda, and salt) 5. Combine the wet ingredients with the dry. 6. Fold in the chocolate chunks/chips. 7. Refrigerate dough for at least 30 minutes (the longer it rests, the more flavor it will have, can store for 3 days). 8. Preheat oven to 350 degrees fahrenheit. Bake for about 10-15 minutes, or until edges are firm while the center is soft. 9. Let cool and sprinkle sea salt on top.
