

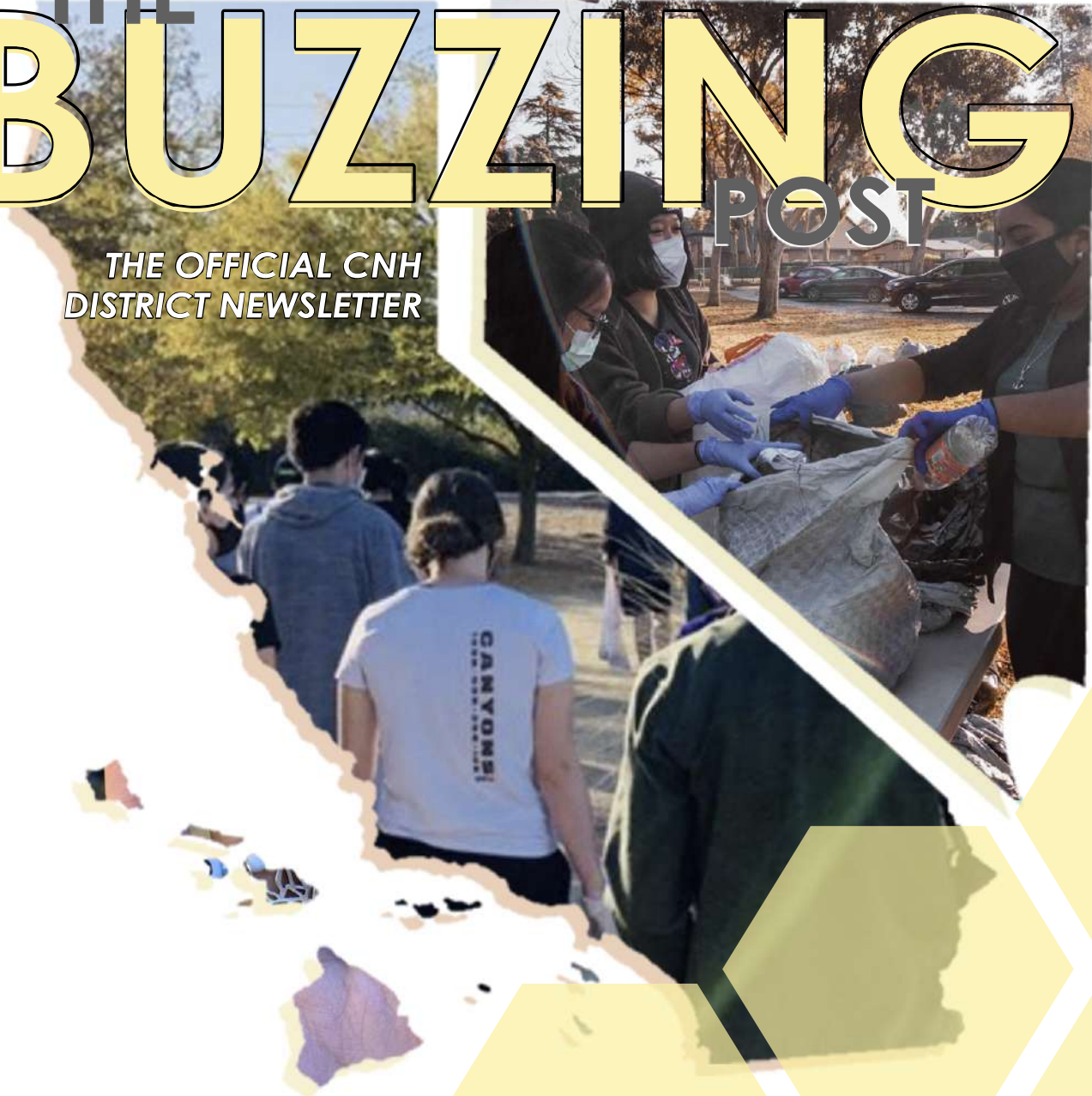

different positions to run for!

PRESIDENT

The President **represents** the club, **set goals** for the term, **delegates** tasks, etc. **Lead** meetings, activities, and service projects. **Communicate** with members and officers.

VICE PRESIDENT

The Vice President(s) **support** the members, **aid** the President, **take initiative to lead, serve, and represent**, etc.

NOTE: TOO MANY VICE PRESIDENTS MAY HINDER PROGRESS & LEADERSHIP

SECRETARY

The Secretary **records** service, fundraising, minutes, etc., **aids** the Treasurer with the club roster, etc.

TREASURER

The Treasurer **prepares/maintains** a **budget, records** transactions, etc.

EDITORS

Club editors or historians, are responsible for **distributing** information about the club including **news, events, or general updates**.

- * **Positions offered vary from each club.**
- * **Club elections are to be held virtually unless the club is already meeting in person.**



PROMOTING ELECTIONS

getting members to vote

A minimum of 50% of the club's due's paid members must be presented for club elections.

Ways to promote elections:

- **Provide incentives** for attending the elections
- **Remind** members that it's their duty to elect new officers
- **Utilize social media** to promote elections!

* **Make sure members vote fairly when deciding the future of the club**

encouraging members to run

ANYONE can **BEE a leader!** Run for a position to take the opportunity to lead and serve your community. Any member in good standing can run.

Benefits of running for office:

- Build up your **confidence, public speaking, communication, AND teamwork** skills!
- Strengthen your time management and organization

CNH CHILDREN'S FUND

PARTNER HOSPITAL PROGRAMS

The Foundation invites our partner hospitals to apply for grants for unfunded needs related directly to pediatric trauma and injury prevention.



Kapi'olani Children's Hospital

Burns are the second leading cause of pediatric trauma injuries and emergency room visits in Hawaii. **With the help of the CNH Children's Funds, Kapi'olani Children's Hospital was able to become Hawaii's first comprehensive pediatric burn program.** This program allowed children under the age of 18 to receive burn care and extended protocols and education on pediatric burn care to medical centers statewide.

Rady Children's Hospital

The CNH Children's Fund provided a \$12,500 grant to Rady Children's Hospital for the development and implementation of a mobile Safety Store for injury prevention. The Safety Store provides safety products and counseling to families who are in need of assistance. It also provides two safety classes, "Safe Beginnings" for new and expectant parents of children up to 3 years of age; and "Safe Start" which provides education to preschool aged children ages 4-6.

In 2011, the foundation provided another grant to implement a visiting nurse program that would continue education training for public health nurses employed by the County of San Diego Health and Human Services.

In 2013, another grant was provided for a Safe N Sound Safety Kiosk that would provide a self-serve computer station for parents to access information on safety and injury prevention for children born to 4 years of age.

In 2020, Rady's hospital received a grant to reduce the number of vehicle related fatalities by expanding the car seat safety instructions event. With the help of local Kiwanis volunteers, they are able to provide car seat safety events.

Valley Children's Hospital

The CNH Children's Fund has provided an annual grant to the Seat Check Saturday since 2014. The purpose of this program was to educate and prevent Motor vehicle collisions injuries. **With the help of the CNH Children's Funds, the hospital is able to partner with other organizations and provide continuous training for safety technicians.** The hospital is also able to donate car seats to low income families and make sure that car seats of attendees who attend the Seat Check Saturday are installed properly and are certified.

This past year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the annual March for Babies was held virtually! By completing a one mile walk or run, friends and families were able to celebrate the neonatal intensive care unit.

CONCLAVE PROCEDURES

what is conclave?

Conclave is an annual election hosted by the Lieutenant Governor of your respective Division to elect the successor of next term. All candidates will give a three to five minute speech outlining their qualifications, goals, and actions for their term as Lieutenant Governor. This is followed by a four minute caucus session where representing delegates and Key Club members in the audience can ask each candidate questions related to their position as Lieutenant Governor. Adults in the audience *may not* ask any questions. Afterwards, delegates will have the chance to vote for whoever they deem most fit for the position.

delegates

Each club in good standing is permitted to have two delegates at Conclave. They will be responsible for casting ballots to vote for the subsequent Lieutenant Governor. Delegates shall vote via a 'secret ballot' once speeches & questions have commenced. Ballots should have the option of 'no confidence' as blank ballots shall not be counted.

campaign materials

Campaigning of any sort and at any point of the election process is not allowed and can result in disqualification. The only campaign material that is permitted is a single double-sided or two single-sided pages of the candidate's literature. The literature will include the candidate's platform as well as resumé. This material is to be distributed during the time of Conclave, only.

voting & ballots

A quorum (50% or more) of clubs in good standing must be present at Conclave. As mentioned earlier, two delegates will come from each club to represent. The candidate with a majority (50% +1) vote in the secret ballot shall be declared the winner. In the event of a tie, the Lieutenant Governor shall cast a vote, as they shall serve as the tiebreaker.

caucus

Once the candidate has given their speech, the next portion of Conclave transitions into the caucus session. Delegates and Key Club members in the audience have the chance to ask the prospective Lieutenant Governor questions regarding their platform, qualifications, goals, etc. They may not ask any personal questions or questions that do not pertain to Key Club. Adults *may not* ask questions.

nominating conference

In the event that there are two or more candidates running for office, a nominating conference will take place. Here, the two candidates who received the most votes will advance to the second round where another set of speeches and caucus session will occur. Delegates will cast another vote to declare the final winner.

INTERNATIONAL CANDIDATE Training Conference

International Candidate Training Conference is an online teleconference that is mandatory for any candidate interested in running for an International position at ICON 2021.

This event will be happening on Tuesday, February 4th, 2021 at 6:00 PST. Register on the CNH Cyberkey by the deadline Monday, January 20th, 2020.
