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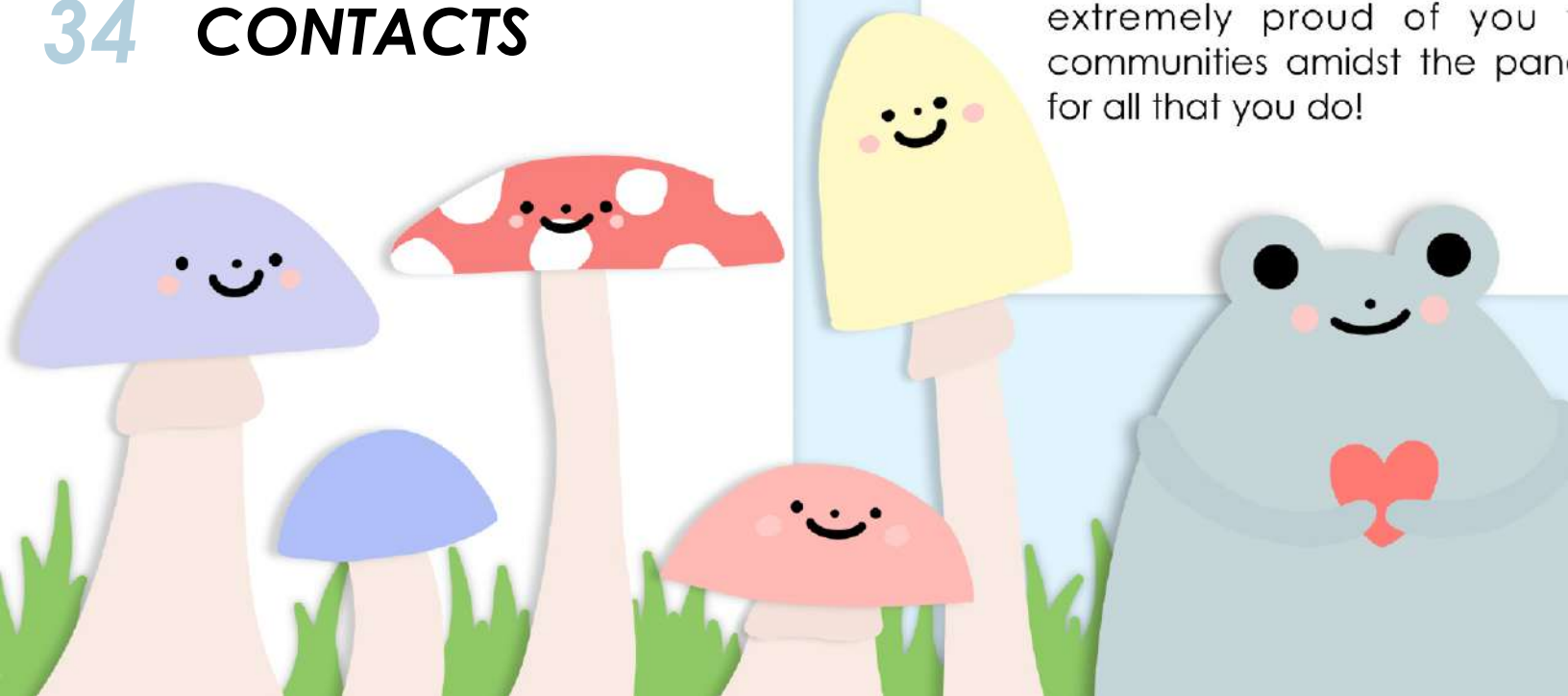

What do they do?

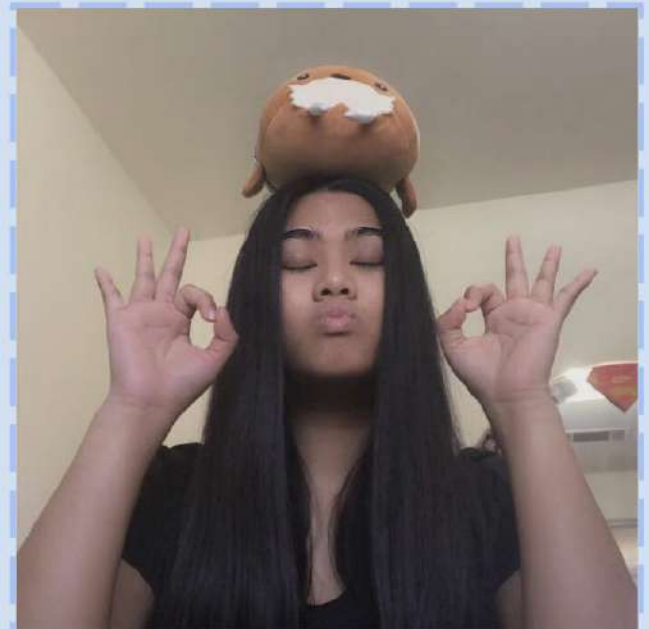
What was your Key Club moment?

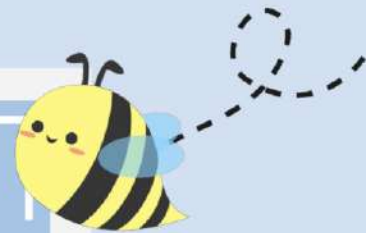

To provide the best care for kids, children's hospitals rely on donations and community support, as Medicaid and insurance programs do not fully cover the cost of care. Children's Miracle Network Hospitals has helped by raising more than \$7 billion, most of it \$1 at a time through Miracle Balloon icon campaigns. Its various fundraising partners, like IHOP support the nonprofit's mission to save and improve the lives of as many children as possible.

STUDENT LOANS

WHAT IS A STUDENT LOAN?

It's a type of loan designed to help students like you to pay for post-secondary education and its associated fees, such as tuition, books and supplies, and living expenses.



TYPES OF STUDENT LOANS PROVIDED BY THE GOVERNMENT

- **Direct Subsidized:** loans given to eligible students who demonstrate financial need with interest paid by the federal government
- **Direct Unsubsidized:** loans given to eligible students with interest paid by the student
- **Direct PLUS:** loans given to eligible students or parents of students based on credit history
- **Private:** loans through banks and other financial institutions that set their own eligibility requirements, such as credit history

TIPS AND TRICKS

- Keep track of how much you're borrowing and borrow only the amount you can afford to repay. Student loan payments should be only a small percentage of your salary after you graduate!
- Research starting salaries in your field to get an idea of how much you are likely to earn after you graduate.
- Understand the terms of your loan and keep copies of your loan documents.
- Make payments on time. You are required to make payments on time even if you don't receive a bill, repayment notice, or a reminder.
- Keep in touch with your loan servicer (the private company that manages your federal student loan payments until they are repaid).

REPAYMENT OPTIONS

- **Standard:** Fixed payments that ensure your loans are paid off within 10 years.
- **Graduated:** Payments are lower at first and then increase, but ensure your loans are paid off within 10 years.
- **Extended:** Fixed or graduated payments that ensure your loans are paid off within 25 years.
- **Revised Pay As You Earn Repayment Plan (REPAYE):** Monthly payments will be 10% of your yearly income.
- **Income-Sensitive Repayment Plan:** Monthly payments based on annual income, but loans will be paid in full within 15 years.



Policy, International Business, and Elections

Caucus and House of Delegates



1. A single room will be used to seat attendees
2. Delegates must attend and Spectators may observe
3. Candidates will present a 3-5 minute speech and respond to Caucus questions presented by the members for 4 minutes
4. Only 1 Candidate can be in the speech/Caucus room at one time

Caucus

Nomination Conference



- The membership of the Nominating Conference shall consist of the delegates-at-large and two delegates representing each club in attendance at the convention.
- The Ballot collectors shall be members of the PIE Committee and the current Lt. Governors.
- The candidates will be introduced to the Conference and voted on in the following order: Governor, Secretary, and Treasurer, and individuals that are seeking International Endorsement.

House of Delegates

- Board members should study Candidates Booklet to make informed decisions.
- 1. At the conclusion of District office elections, the Chair of the PIE Committee will present any proposed District Bylaw changes that have been approved for ratification by the House of Delegates.
- 2. Ballots will be counted to make sure only the committee advisor(s) to know the final results. Those results will be placed in individually sealed envelopes and handed to the person announcing the results at the designated time.



Rules



Club Elections

1. Club President shall announce the elections deadlines and official club election date.
2. Candidates running must be dues-paid.
3. Candidates must complete CNH Service Agreement Form, Medical Release Form, and Kiwanis Release Form
4. Submit all forms to Club President and Advisor(s) at least a week prior to elections
5. Absolutely no campaigning!



Voting



1. Club elections are to held virtually unless the club is meeting in-person
2. For voting, delegates are to be in a separate breakout room and receive a Google Form to cast their vote.
3. Advisors will then tally the vote and let the current presiding officer announce the results.

Nomination Conference

1. Make sure the club meets quorum (50% of the dues-paid members should be present).
2. If there are more than 2 candidates running for office, clubs may host a Nomination Conference to narrow down all the candidates to only 2 individuals running for office.

scholarships and leadership training

The Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund contributed more than \$1.5 million in support of its Student Leadership Programs over the last decade. If you are a current senior, please consider applying for the Kiwanis Cal-Nev-Ha Foundation Scholarship! The application is due on February 12, 2021. If you are interested in becoming a student leader, develop your skills at Key Leader, a weekend-long leadership program where you will obtain tools and techniques to become an effective leader. During COVID, the same Key Leader experience can be completed online by searching for "Virtual Key Leader".

grant funding

The Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund offers an array of grant programs to members of the Kiwanis Cal-Nev-Ha Family to enhance and further their efforts to build a better future for our children. The grant program makes projects for disaster assistance, PTP, and special needs communities possible by providing start-up funds.

pediatric trauma program

The Pediatric Trauma Program, one of the preferred charities of the Cal-Nev-Ha Key Club District, aims to provide education and training in areas of pediatric trauma and injury prevention. By providing community outreach and materials, providing grants to partner hospitals, and holding projects to address pediatric trauma, the program aims to reduce the number of children who are killed or injured by trauma. YOUR donations to PTP are spent as grants to partner hospitals, grants to Kiwanis and SLP clubs, and PTP safety items.

what is the kiwanis family house?

The *Kiwanis Family House* (KFH) was built through the efforts of many Kiwanis club volunteers from the Sacramento area! Their mission is to provide temporary housing and support to families of seriously ill or injured children and adults, and like Key Club, they have a set of core values guided by the KIWANIS Service Motto: "Serving the Children of the World". From 2019-2020, KFH has been able to successfully house 1,305 families and provide 8,711 overnight rooms. We are so proud to support KFH as our Governor's Project!



frequently asked questions

Who is eligible to stay at the Kiwanis Family House?

- ❑ Eligible guests at the Kiwanis Family House have family members being treated at the UC Davis Health System and Shriners Hospital and who live 35 miles or more from Sacramento.
- ❑ Each guest family is referred by the UC Davis Health System, either by the medical staff or social worker.



Is food provided for guests at the Kiwanis Family House?

- ❑ The food closet at the Kiwanis Family House provides food to just-arriving guest families.
- ❑ Each guest family is assigned to a refrigerator and cupboard space to store their purchased food. Meals are self-prepared by the families.

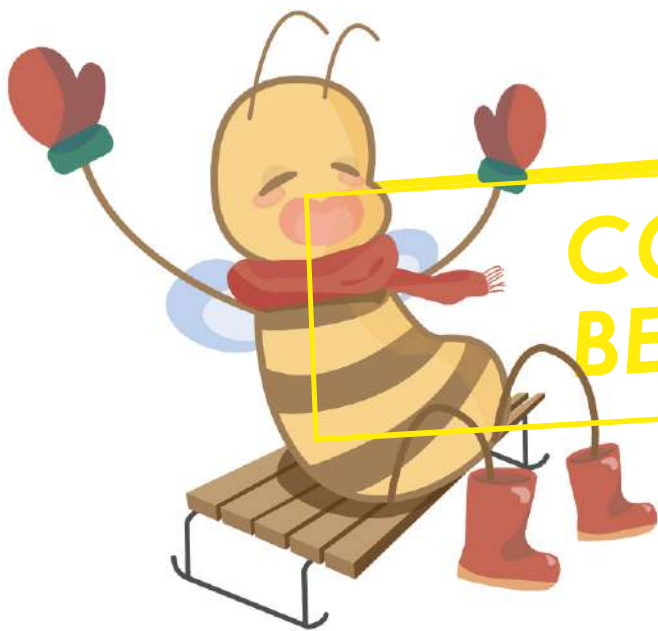
