What is KIWIN'S?



KIWIN'S

KIWIN'S are the 32nd District of Key Club International. They uniquely share the same geographical location as the CNH Key Club District (us), meaning they have over 44 clubs across the same 3 states! With over 2,500 members, they are continuously growing, sharing their special history. A past CNH Kiwanis District Governor named Sid Smith wanted his own daughters to be able to join a service organization; however, due to the previously restrictive male-only rule, his daughters were unable to join KC. He and other school principals and Kiwanis Advisors created the "Key-wanattes". The Keywanattes became a fast-growing community service club. It originally had four districts: CNH, Texas, West Virginia, and the Carolinas; however, the other districts, EXCEPT for CNH Keywanattes, merged with other Key Club Districts. The Keywanattes convened at the 1995 CNH Convention during House of Delegates, in which they decided to change their name to KIWIN'S. CNH KIWIN'S focus on promoting good citizenship through community service.

*One Family. One Mission.
One Word: KIWIN'S.*

Why is KIWIN'S spelled the way it is?

The word "Kiwin" is derived from the Ojibwe Indian language's word "Anokwin", which translates to "people, men and women, working together in service". KIWIN'S is ALWAYS capitalized to showcase its unique individuality as an organization.

How is KIWIN'S different from the CNH District?

Although KIWIN'S shares geographical boundaries with the Cali-Nev-Ha District, the culmination of their present-day District came from a very special history showcasing the leadership and determination of the original Keywanattes that spear-headed the CNH Keywanattes District. They are still Key Clubbers just like us!





KIWIN'S Q&A

KATRINA LIANG, KIWIN'S KFF CHAIR

Please provide a little information about yourself and what you do as KIWIN'S KFF Chair.

Hi! My name is Katrina Liang and I proudly serve as the Kiwanis Family and Foundation's Chair for CNH KIWIN'S. My responsibilities as chair range from a multitude of things. I help promote all Kiwanis Family opportunities such as grants and scholarships, provide and make resources for everything about the Kiwanis Family, and such is all done with the help of my Kiwanis Family and International Relations Committee that I chair. In addition, I also interact and strengthen KIWIN'S bonds with the other branches of the Kiwanis Family. **LIKE RIGHT NOW!!**

How are Key Club and KIWIN'S similar?

Overall Key Club and KIWIN'S are similar in many ways however KIWIN'S has many unique features and amazing opportunities that make KIWIN'S, KIWIN'S.

How are Key Club and KIWIN'S different?

Aside from screaming Awooga instead of Abooga when asked "How do you feel" as well as having a bear mascot named KIWI instead of a bee, I would say a big difference is our size. Numbers wise KIWIN'S is much smaller compared to CNH Key Club due to us only having 9 Divisions in total. However, due to such, much more opportunities are open to members. Such as having more guidance from Kiwanians, the ability to apply for District Committees (which is not possible for Key Club), and also having a strong Ohana due to the close-knit community. Speaking of Ohana KIWIN'S has one more core value than Key Club and such is Ohana! Though we may be smaller our passion for service and love for our Ohana is immeasurable by numbers!

I decide to serve KIWIN'S, specifically Kiwanis Family and Foundation Chair primarily due to my significant love and involvement in the Kiwanis Family. Coming from a school that has both a KIWIN'S and Key Club as well as serving in both, having a great connection to my Kiwanians, and having mentors from Circle K I've gained a great love and passion for the Kiwanis Family. What made me want to serve in KIWIN'S is the unique and amazing family they have that you simply cannot find in any other branch. 1. IDENTIFYING AND RECRUITING NEW MEMBERS

With **inclusiveness** being one of our 4 core values, it's important to remember that **everyone** can be a **key** member. During club rush and throughout the year, try to reach out a multitude of demographics and inspire their passion for service.

1. Don't be afraid to be loud and proud, reaching out to new members who may be from different grades or backgrounds.

3. For those who already want to perform community service, let them know that Key Club is a great avenue to find new opportunities.

2. PROMOTING AT SCHOOL

Publicizing information through **multiple formats** will help spread the word. Be sure to take advantage of the resources at your disposal.

EX:

- Club Social Media (Remind, Instagram, Discord, Facebook Messenger, TikTok)
- School Announcements (Bulletin Board, Overhead Speaker, Flyers, Advertising to Teachers)

Everyone has a busy schedule, so try to announce events at least 2 weeks in advance, so people can plan accordingly!



3. PROMOTING TO PARENTS

Given that Key Club participates in off-campus and sometimes overnight activities, it's important to keep parents informed of what Key Club is and what we do to ensure everyone's safety.

1. **Invite them to events:** Key Club maintains a standard '1 adult : 10 student ratio' at all events, so inviting them to oversee our activities will allow them to gain some firsthand insight.
2. **Talk to them about the events:** Personal anecdotes are powerful! Whether it be a service event, DCM, or fundraiser, provide your parents a brief overview of what was accomplished that day.

BONUS: Share photos / videos of yourself and the events you participated in! If you don't take them yourself, reach out to your club editor!

4. PROMOTING TO KIWANIS

Their iconic motto of "**Serving the Children of the World**" is no exaggeration! Our generous Kiwanians want to help in any capacity they can! Establishing a relationship with them will ease your process through more complicated concerns in the future, such as coordinating transportation, funds, and chaperones.

1. **Remember to invite them to YOUR events:** DCMs, Club Meetings, Service Events, etc! Help them stay informed via email.
2. **If offered, attend THEIR events:** DCMs, Club Meetings, Service Events, etc! As our adult counterpart, having Key Club's presence will strengthen both parties' understanding of each other.

Finally, Start the school year off with a BANG! This can be done through hosting an event such as an interclub, Awake-A-Thon, club social or anything else. Show people the fun of Key Club as soon as they join you!"

5. HOSTING EFFECTIVE EVENTS / MEMBER RETENTION



AMENDMENTS PASSED

what do they mean for CNH?

Amendment #1

Called for edits to Article XII of the Key Club International Bylaws. Its purpose was stated to give "the International Board leeway to vote via an online platform and transact business if normal board meetings cannot be held."

Considering the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting utilization of remote communications, this is an extremely relevant amendment that is sure to benefit our organization!



Amendment #2

Pertained to Article XIII of our International Bylaws: International Council. It proposed adding these specifications to the existing text: "In the event that a council meeting cannot be held, the committee on elections will recommend a suitable format for elections". This might entail voting occurring virtually, amongst the International Council, and so on. The passing of this amendment will grant flexibility to elections if unusual circumstances interfere with normal International Convention business.






AWESOME




