CNH Contest Archive Google Classroom

- ★ All contest resources will be accessible throughout the **CNH cyberkey**.
- ★ Furthermore, district judged contest entries will now be **submitted to these classrooms**; division judged contest entries will still be submitted via email.
- ★ For more information regarding the CNH Contest Archive Google Classroom check out the upcoming video "**What's the CNH Contest Archive Google Classroom**" that can be found on the district Instagram or the link located on the recognition page of the cyberkey.

Contest Guidelines

- ★ Guidelines now have a more user-friendly layout with **bigger and easier** to read text, **separate pages** for the specific guidelines for a better view, and **directly fillable form fields**, which have been added to the individual e-portfolio templates of each contest.
- ★ The word limit for the statement of nomination has now been decreased from 1000 words to **500 words**.
- ★ For each portfolio the page limit is now **60 pages**, however, the number of pages does not reflect the final score of the e-portfolio.

Individual E-Portfolio Templates

Each contest will now feature its own e-portfolio template to help aid the applicant in the process of applying and creating an e-portfolio for their contest submissions. These templates will give applicants a better understanding of what an e-portfolio should consist of, as well as look like, instead of providing a previously submitted e-portfolio, which can limit one's creativity. Each individual e-portfolio contest template will be located on their respective CNH Contest Archive Google Classroom.

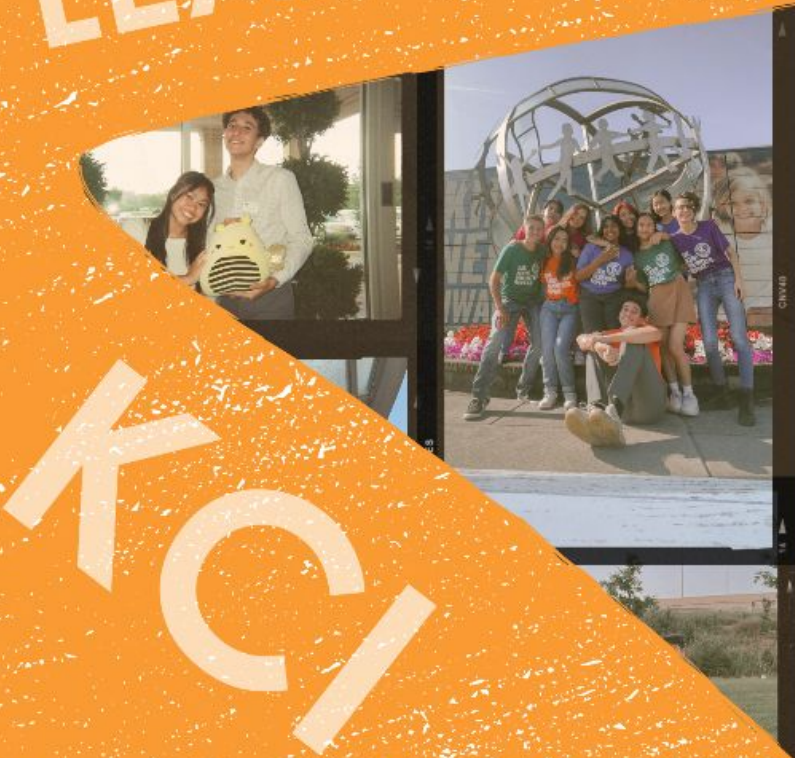

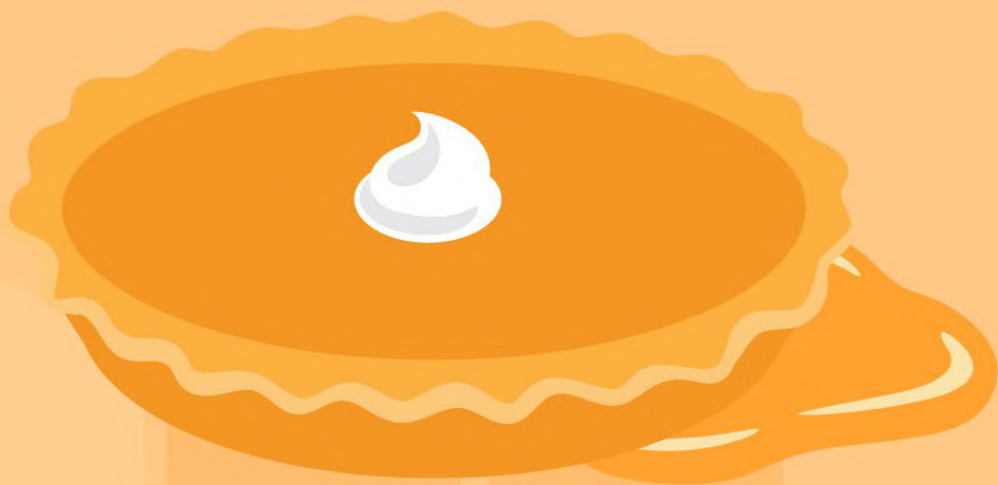

DUE PROCESS

due process

In simple terms, the Due Process is the removal of officers, it should only be used as a last resort.

1. The President, Kiwanis Advisor, and Faculty Advisor shall meet with the officer in question to privately discuss how the officer can improve their performance.
2. If the officer continues to neglect their responsibilities, the officer board must hold a meeting to either approve or reject the recommendation. If approved, a meeting should be held with the entire club to vote on the removal of an officer. A majority vote of 2/3 of dues-paid members is required for the removal to be approved.
3. The school, advisors, and Lt. Governor should be notified of the removal.
4. In the event that any officer is removed from office, they will be notified by the secretary in writing.

policy

Details the operations of an organization. Policies are more detailed and adaptable.

bylaw

Defines the governing rules of an organization. Bylaws are rigid and take priority over policies.

How can a District policy or bylaw be added or revised?

Any Key Club in good standing may propose to add, delete, or revise the District Policy Manual. All proposals must be sent to the Kiwanis District Office. To revise District bylaws, any Key Club in good standing can make a proposal to revise the District bylaws. The proposal must be endorsed by the club's respective Lieutenant Governor and sponsoring Kiwanis Club President. The proposal must be submitted in writing to the Kiwanis District Office no later than November 1st in order for it to be considered at the House of Delegates at DCON.

Where can I find my club bylaws?

Contact your Faculty/Kiwanis Advisor, President, Secretary, or school administration to find your club's bylaws. If your club does not have existing bylaws, refer to Key Club International's Standard Form Club Bylaws to create and adopt new bylaws. They must be approved by a quorum consisting of 2/3 of the club's membership and a majority vote.

How can I change my club's bylaws?

Proposed amendments should either be read at a regular meeting or sent to each member in writing. After at least one week from the initial proposal, a 2/3 vote of dues-paid members present at a regular meeting will allow amendments to be adopted.
